Mansonville United Church

The United Church Women have been an important organization in church life for many years and continue to bring a crucial element of spiritual vitality and practical support to their church and to the wider community.

This year the Vale Perkins church was re-opened as a preaching point sharing services with the congregation of St-Paul's Anglican Church. The present Mansonville-Bolton Centre-Vale Perkins Pastoral Charge serves approximately 200 families in the communities that surround Owl's Head Mountain. Through its ministry to teen-age youth open to all residents and its new ministry to week-end skiers, the Charge seeks to serve the whole community.

Since its inception as a congregation in 1873, Mansonville United Church has had an uninterrupted history as a worshipping fellowship. Thrity-five ordained ministers have served the church community during those years.**

The Mansonville United Church has its roots in early Methodism, beginning its congregational life as the Mansonville Methodist Mission in 1873. In those early years the Mission was divided into "Classes" which met in various locations in Mansonville, Vale Perkins, South Bolton, Province Hill, West Hill, Dunkin, Leadville, Owl's Head, McNeil's Crossing and Highwater.

The first church building was completed in Mansonville in 1879 but was destroyed in the fire of 1893. The present building was dedicated in 1894 and the manse completed in early 1897.

In these early years, and until the formation of the United Church of Canada in 1925, the local congregations were supported in part by the Methodist Board of Home Missions. When the Methodist, Congregationalist and the majority of Presbyterian churches joined to become the United Church, the Mansonville area continued to receive support from the new national church. Vale Perkins continued as a separate preaching point until its members voted to close their church and attend at Mansonville. In a reorganization of local area preaching points Bolton Centre joined with Mansonville in the 1960's. In 1969 the Mansonville-Bolton Centre Pastoral Charge became completely self-supporting and remains so today.
